through Yeshiva University's Early Decision Honors were accepted and received considerable academic scholarships. 

On Sunday, December 18, well over 100 students from 32 high schools teams in the NY Metro area took part in the third annual Bergen County History Bee and Bowl held at TABC. The event is one of approximately 100 regional tournaments around the country organized by The National History Bee and Bowl, an organization founded by Ridgewood native and former 19 day champion on Jeopardy!, David Madden.

Attending students took part in both the History Bee (for individual students) and the History Bowl (for school teams). Thirty teams including TABC, Ma'ayanot, MTA and Central. The top half of students and teams in the Bee and the Bowl qualified for a chance to attend the 2017 National Championships next April in Arlington, Virginia.

Helfgot were able to qualify for the National Tournament. Nathanael Vinar ultimately took 3rd place. In the individual Varsity Bee, Yehuda Koslowe '17 and Yosef Kahan '18 qualified for the national tournament finishing 1st and 3rd respectively. During the lunch break a number of students took the United States History Bee qualifying examination. Of all the students in the Varsity competition, our Yehuda Koslowe finished first with Yosef Kahan finishing third. In the JV division TABC finished 2nd, 3rd and 4th with Nathanael Viner, Avraham Kahan and Ephraim Helfgot respectively.

In the team competition there was both a Varsity and JV division. In the JV History Bowl TABC's squad not only qualified for the National tournament but made it into the quarterfinal round before being knocked out (they had gone 3-2 in the preliminary rounds). The Varsity squad was one of three Yeshiva teams to make the playoffs finishing the preliminary rounds as the seventh seed with a record of 3-2. MTA and Central also qualified for the playoffs, but as lower seeds. The TABC varsity team was eliminated in the round of sixteen, but still qualified for the national tournament.

In each of the six categories, Torah Academy team members finished ahead of all the other Yeshivot in attendance.

Juniors Visit Lower East Side

Last Thursday, December 15th, the entire Junior class along with several faculty chaperones, braved the frigid temperatures to travel "back in time" as part of their study of American immigration patterns. The day was scheduled to begin at the Lower East Side Tenement Museum,



but due to unfortunate delays by the bus company, the horrific "seasonal" traffic and gridlock, our group arrived too late for the scheduled tour. As students took in the sights around them and visited the Museum shop, an outstanding back up plan was devised! Thanks to the efforts of Mr. Donnie Adler, father of Shmuel, ('18) who so generously made time in his day to give the students a brief talk about the history of immigration on the Lower East Side in the historical Bialystoker Shul, the group was able to warm up and gain more insight into what life was like for many of our ancestors when they arrived to America. From there the group once again participated in a walking tour of the area as they headed for the next destination, the Eldridge Street Synagogue. Students and faculty enjoyed a very informative tour with Ms. Rachel Serkin, Senior Educator, at the Museum at Eldridge Street. "What an amazing program! So much information and so many knowledgeable student representatives under one roof!" These were some of the many positive comments heard after our annual Jewish Life on Campus Program, held Thursday night, December 22nd, for the junior parents and students of Torah Academy of Bergen County and Ma'ayanot. All felt privileged to hear from almost thirty student representatives and JLIC rabbis/educators, hailing from almost twenty OU-JLIC (Jewish Learning Initiative on Campus) affiliated universities, including such varied schools as Princeton, Cornell, SUNY at Binghamton, Cooper Union, New York University, Columbia/Barnard, University of Pennsylvania, Drexel, University of Chicago, Brandeis, University of Illinois at Urbana Champaign, Johns Hopkins, University of Maryland, Rutgers, Queens, Hunter and, of course, Yeshiva University. The presentation was followed by an informal question and answer period in the gym. Both students and parents appreciated each student highlighting what makes his/her college "Jewishly" unique, with many in the audience filling their programs with notes and others staying late into the evening to ask their specific questions of the many students and JLIC rabbis who participated in the evening. It was both gratifying and heartwarming to see so many TABC and Ma'ayanot alumni, representing a full range of prestigious colleges and talking animatedly about the shiurim, minyanim and other Jewish-related activities that they make it their business to seek out and participate in, no matter which college they attend. Anyone watching so many intelligent and exemplary Jewish youth speaking so eloquently about the Jewish life they have chosen to either participate in or fundamentally create within the colleges of their choice would have been proud. Most of the colleges have JLIC rabbi educators on their campuses as well, who are sent from the OU and work in partnership with Hillel, to help college students navigate the college environment and balance their Jewish commitments with their desire to engage in the secular world. The program was jointly organized by the College Guidance Departments of TABC and Ma'ayanot, through the diligent work of Dr. Carol Master, also Chair of the English Department at TABC, and Ms. Leebie Mallin, Director of College Guidance at Ma'ayanot. Our Head of School Rabbi Yablok and Ma'ayanot Principal Mrs. Kahan introduced the evening, that was attended by Dr. Garry Katz, Director of College Guidance at TABC and Dr. Elliot Prager, also part of the TABC College Guidance Department. Rabbi Gideon Black, Director of Professional Recruitment and Leadership Development at the Jewish Learning Initiative on Campus (JLIC), explained JLIC's purpose. As a strong

testament to all that JLIC does on college campuses, many of the JLIC educators, Tali Weiss of Binghamton, Rabbi Chaim Finson of Cornell, Mrs. Channah Cohen of Queens College, Rabbi Frieberg of Rutgers and our alumnus Rabbi Noam Friedman of Columbia, also attended. Dr. Katz and Dr. Master had recently met and had the opportunity to discuss the full picture of Jewish life on college campuses with these and other rabbi/educators at the OU-JLIC Conference held on December 15th in New York.

Chumash Y13 - Parshat Vayeishev

Ever wonder about the meaning of the dots that Soferim (scribes) traditionally place above certain words in the Torah? Rabbi Dr. Schnall's Chumash class spent several days exploring the meaning of the dots that appear in Parshat Bamidbar, as well as the dots that appear in many of the Parshiyot in Sefer Bereishit that we read this time of year. For example, ask your son to explain to you what the dots in Parshat Vayeishev tell us about the intentions of Yosef's brothers in Shechem that we read about this week.
